

Welcome from The Principal



On behalf of members of staff, pupils and governors, I would like to take this opportunity to welcome you to Brockington College. Welcome Booklet

We have included within our Welcome Booklet the information that we feel is essential for you to know at this point. Please do not worry if you need further explanation on any item, as we will discuss all matters with you at the Welcome Evening in July. We do appreciate that there is a lot of information and will ensure that you and your child are put at ease.

Year 6 Induction Days

On Monday 9 July 2018 and Tuesday 10 July 2018, your child is invited to our Brockington College Induction Days. Over the two days, we will give pupils opportunities to experience lessons within the school and also to get to know their new tutor group by undertaking team building activities. Both days will start at 8.40 am and pupils should arrive between 8.20 am and 8.35 am and make their way into the college. Guides will then show them into the main hall. Pupils are requested to wear their current school uniform.

On the Induction Days and for the first few days of term, pupils will be able to buy a hot lunch for £3.00. This will include a choice of main meal, a dessert and a drink. Items on sale at break will cost up to a £1.00. Those children in receipt of free school meals will be able to have their entitled meal at Brockington and we have contacted primary schools to provide us with this information.

Items to bring on Induction Days:

- a pencil case with pen, pencil, eraser and coloured pencils
- money for lunch or a packed lunch
- training shoes (needed on both days)
- all reply slips from the separate sheets within the Welcome Pack
- completed 'Moving on Up' transition booklet
- completed numeracy bridging work (only for pupils who have done this at their current primary school)

Instead of completing numeracy bridging work at primary school, some pupils will have been asked to complete the work independently at home over the summer holiday period. If this applies to your child, they should bring their completed numeracy work with them at the start of the new academic year.

The Induction Days will end at 3.00 pm. If you are collecting your child, please arrange to meet them in the car park or outside, rather than inside the front entrance of the college. There will be staff available if you have any questions.

Year 6 Welcome Evening for Parents/Carers

On the evening of Monday 9 July 2018, you are invited to a Welcome Meeting at 7.00 pm in the main hall at Brockington College. The evening will begin with a short talk by the Principal and Head of Year 7, followed by an opportunity for you to meet your child's form tutor and be given detailed information about key areas of the college. Members of the Senior Leadership Team will also be available to answer any questions that you may have.

Due to the large number of people attending, we are inviting parents/carers only to come along to this meeting. Please note that our car park is likely to fill very quickly, as it will also be used by adult learners and sports facility users. If you are able, we would recommend walking or parking in our car park off Mill Lane or on Mill Lane itself.

On Monday 9 July 2018, our college uniform suppliers, Match Fit Kit, will be available in college from 2.00 pm to 5.00 pm and from 6.00 pm to 9.00 pm for parents/carers to order items of uniform. If you would like your child to try on items of uniform for size, this will be possible when you collect them at 3.00 pm. Please see the enclosed uniform information sheets for further details.



Ethos

Pupils have assemblies each week led by a member of staff from school or from the local Christian community. Within assemblies, pupils are encouraged to look at aspects of life from various points of view.





The College Day



Brockington College pupils begin school at 8.40 am and pupils are expected to be at school at 8.30 am. The college currently operates a staggered break and lunch for Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4 pupils.

There is currently a consultation being undertaken with parents/carers and members of staff, to take views on the shortening of lunchtime by ten minutes. If this proposal is approved by the Governing Board, the school day will finish at 3.00 pm.

After School Clubs


There is an extensive programme of activities available to pupils at the end of each day. Timetables of all clubs, societies, trips and visits will be posted on the website each term.

Extra support with independent learning will also be on offer in the library after school hours. Pupils can seek advice or simply use the extensive range of technology facilities to assist them with their studies.

Pupil Premium Breakfast Club

A good breakfast is an essential way to start the day and it is especially important to assist learning. Pupils who qualify for free school meals are eligible to attend Breakfast Club each day, which runs from 7.50 am at Key Stage 3 and 8.00 am at Key Stage 4.

If you think you may be eligible to claim for free school meals for your child, please ensure that you read the separate information leaflets included in the Welcome Pack for further information. We would encourage all who are eligible to apply, so that we receive the extra funding as a school.



Break Time and Lunch Time

Break and lunch take place in our open courtyard area in the centre of the school. A wide range of food is available from the main canteen, which serves hot meals (including a vegetarian option), jacket potatoes and pasta. Food is also available from the 'Baguette Bar', which serves freshly made sandwiches, rolls and other snacks and drinks. Pupils can pre-order food from the Baguette Bar by completing an order form at break for collection at lunch time.

Cashless Payment System

Our biometric payment system allows pupils to pay for their college meals by placing their finger on a scanner at the point of sale. Each pupil registers with the system via their fingerprint, which is translated to a unique, alphanumeric code and the fingerprint is then deleted. Please ensure that you complete and return the Brockington College Consent Form included in the Welcome Pack, as we require parental consent for registration to the system, which takes place on the first day of school in August. After the first few days of the autumn term, payment for items purchased at the school canteen will be through our biometric system.

There are three ways that money can be added to the system:


1. **ParentPay.** This is a secure online account linked to your child and is the preferred method of payment for cashless catering accounts, trips and other one-off school related events (see below).
2. **PayPoint.** Payments can be made at local shops displaying the PayPoint symbol. The store will scan a barcode issued to you by the college and the payment will be credited to your child's account. Requests for PayPoint barcodes need to be made via the school finance office if required.
3. **Cash.** We prefer pupils not to bring cash into school. However, if accounts need to be topped up because parents/carers have been unable to do so online, small amounts of cash (notes and coins) can be inserted into the cash loading machines located opposite the servery in the courtyard. This money goes directly onto the child's account.

Pupils eligible for free school meals will automatically have £3.10 credited to their account at the start of each school day. Any money not spent from this allowance will be taken off the account at the end of each day.

ParentPay

Parents/carers will be given their ParentPay activation details at the Welcome Evening on Monday 9 July 2018. If you are unable to attend, the details will be posted to your home address. Once these details have been received, parents/carers will need to log in at www.parentpay.com and register their details in 'My Profile' before making secure payments. If you already have a ParentPay account, you will need to log in as usual, enter the activation details provided when prompted and follow the instructions to 'add a child'.

Please ensure that you have registered to ParentPay and that money has been added to the ParentPay account before your child's first day of school in August.



School Uniform

It is important that pupils take pride in their uniform, in the same way that we expect them to be proud of the work they undertake in the classroom.

Full uniform lists are included separately in the Welcome Pack. Uniform can be purchased from our suppliers, Match Fit Kit, either online or in person at Brockington College on Monday 9 July 2018 between 2.00 pm and 5.00 pm or between 6.00 pm and 9.00 pm. After school on the Induction Day, parents/carers will have the opportunity to view our uniform and bring along their child to try some on for size. This service will also be available at selected times at Brockington College over the summer holidays. Uniform ordered from Match Fit Kit will be delivered to your home address.

The governors' policy on college uniform must be followed by all pupils. Decisions on the suitability of all uniform items and appearance are at the discretion of Brockington College. If in doubt as to the appropriateness of uniform items, please contact the college for advice. We would take this opportunity to ask parents/carers to support us in upholding our Uniform Policy and remind everyone of the statements within the home/school agreement enclosed.

Please remember that hairstyles should be suitable for school and pupils must avoid 'extreme' colours and styles. For pupils in Year 9 and above, make-up should not be obvious, eg 'orange foundation', lipstick, heavy eyeliner, false eyelashes or nails.




All uniform issues will be brought to the attention of the pastoral team and where possible resolved by the provision of appropriate clothing items. In extreme cases, pupils may be placed in 'isolation' until the matter is resolved satisfactorily.

Mobile Telephones

Pupils may bring a mobile telephone to school, but this is at their own risk. Pupils must ensure that mobile telephones remain in lockers throughout the school day. If a mobile telephone is seen during school hours, it will be confiscated and parents/carers will have to collect it from the school office the following day.

Equipment



Being ready to learn, includes having the right equipment.


Please use the following checklist to ensure that your child has what is required at the start of term and to bring to school each day in their school bag:

- Pencils (HB)
- Pens (black and blue)
- Coloured pencils
- Eraser
- Clear ruler
- Good quality glue stick
- A small set of unbranded ear buds or headphones (for music and computing lessons)
- A pencil case
- A maths set (protactor, compasses)
- A scientific calculator (eg Casio)




Pupils can purchase items from our school shop, 'The Cabin', using our cashless payment system.

At the start of the academic year, pupils in Year 7 will be issued with a 'wallet' to carry books and equipment around the college.



Parents/carers – please help your child by ensuring that they have the correct equipment with them every day.





Attendance

It is clearly in the best interest of every pupil that they attend school regularly and hence we have very high expectations around pupils' attendance. It is the responsibility of parents/carers to ensure that pupils are at school on time, properly dressed and equipped. However, there may be very good reasons why your child cannot attend and we would ask you to inform the school immediately should this situation arise.

If your son or daughter is ill, you are asked to contact the school by telephone and follow instructions to leave a message on the dedicated absence line. Alternatively, you can email studentabsence@brockington.leics.sch.uk or text 0116 326 0247. We routinely check some messages to ensure legitimacy. Provided that the reason falls within the regulations set down by the Department for Education, the absence will be recorded as 'authorised'. Absences that fall outside of these regulations will be recorded as 'unauthorised'.

If an illness is likely to involve an absence for a prolonged period then we will send work home. This is especially important when working towards examinations.

In line with current legislation, the school policy regarding family holidays during term time is that a pupil leave of absence will only be authorised if proven exceptional circumstances apply. Any leave of absence taken without authorisation will be recorded as unauthorised and will be referred to our Attendance Manager. Penalty notices to both parents/carers of each child they have at the school may be issued. In the case of exceptional circumstances, please write to the principal giving full details.

Overall attendance at the college is very good and we aim to work with all parents/carers to ensure that it remains consistently high. Please be aware that potential employers and further education providers automatically request attendance records.

If a pupil is absent, we:

- will contact parents/carers on the first day of absence if no reason for absence has been received
- may visit your home
- will invite parents/carers to a meeting to discuss the matter, if the situation persists
- will refer the matter to our Attendance Manager, if attendance falls below 90%

Please remember:



90% Attendance = ½ day missed every week

1 school year at 90% attendance = 4 whole weeks of lessons missed

90% attendance over 5 years of secondary school = ½ school year missed

17 missed school days a year = one GCSE grade drop in achievement

Punctuality

Poor punctuality is not acceptable. If a pupil misses the start of the day, they can miss important information. Pupils who arrive late also disrupt lessons and the learning of others and this can cause embarrassment. We expect pupils to arrive in good time to learn, hence, the school bell is at 8.30 am to allow pupils time to get to their lockers, sort out their belongings and arrive at tutor group on time. If a pupil arrives at school after 8.35 am, they will receive a detention and parents/carers will be informed.


If a pupil is persistently late, parents/carers will be required to meet with relevant college staff in an attempt to resolve the problem. However, parents/carers can approach the college at any time if they are having problems getting their child to school punctually.

Curriculum

One of the driving principles at Brockington College is to provide our pupils with an outstanding, varied and personalised education.

We aim to provide courses that meet the aptitudes and aspirations of all our pupils and ensure those who require extra help receive it, be they high attainers or pupils with Education, Health Care Plans or Individual Health Care Plans

Pupils will follow a two-year Key Stage 3 and a three-year Key Stage 4 curriculum. Pupils will pick options in Year 8 and then study their GCSEs for three years, in order to allow them to focus on the specific skills and knowledge required to be successful at GCSE.

Whilst in Key Stage 3, pupils will study a broad curriculum enabling them to build the skills they need for the challenge of Key Stage 4 and to ensure they become well-rounded citizens of the future.

Alongside lessons in English, maths and science, all pupils have lessons in art, design technology (including food and nutrition), computing, drama, geography, history, music, PE, a language and religious studies. Classes are composed in a variety of different ways, such as tutor groups, mixed tutor groups and academic sets. Each subject has formatted their groups based on the best outcomes at GCSE and this may be different from what pupils experienced at primary school. We acknowledge that pupils come from a range of schools and experiences, therefore, groups are reviewed on a regular basis. If parents/carers have any concerns, please contact the college to discuss these further.

Music Tuition

There is a wide range of instrumental tuition available at Brockington College, which is provided by a variety of expert private instrumental teachers. In most cases, your child will need to have their own instrument and bring it into school for lessons (with the obvious exception of drum kit and piano.)



Homework

Homework is an effective way to help your child extend their learning and improve their ability to work independently, as well as developing skills of perseverance and self-discipline. It is also an excellent way for parents/carers to be involved in their child's learning.

The homework timetable is published in September. We use an online system called 'Show My Homework'. Pupils and parents/carers will be issued with login details allowing pupils to access the homework and parents/carers the opportunity to monitor what is being completed. Personal, Social, Health and Citizenship Education (PSHCE)



Pupils are taught a range of life skills within their PSHCE lessons. The topics covered include bullying, democracy, E-safety, forced marriage and issues related to mental health.

We believe that the topics taught in this non-examined subject are vital to facilitating opportunities for pupils to enquire, seek advice and build resilience in a supportive way.

The content of the curriculum for each year group is published on the school website and via the school bulletin each year. Legally, parents/carers have a right to remove their children from relationships and sex education lessons. We would, however, strongly advise parents/carers against taking such action. Every effort is taken to ensure that the content and style of these lessons is inclusive and appropriate, enabling pupils from all backgrounds and faiths to feel comfortable and make a contribution.

Transport



This section of the Welcome Booklet outlines the different ways of travelling to Brockington College.

Cycling

We have a limited number of cycle rack spaces, so if your child wishes to cycle to school, they should apply for a permit in September.

Once they have been allocated a cycle permit and parking space, it is important that bikes are locked securely on the school grounds, (the best way is to lock the bike frame and rear wheel to the bike rack and to make sure that the lock is facing the ground).

Pupils cycling to school should ensure that they are dressed appropriately (eg bright clothing and helmet) and that their bike is regularly maintained to ensure safety. Pupils must cycle sensibly and have regard for other users of roads and pathways. Pupils are not allowed to ride their bikes anywhere on the school site.

School Buses

Andrews of Leicester operates private bus routes directly into Brockington College (please see the separate information sheet within the Welcome Pack). Parents/carers will need to liaise directly with Andrews of Leicester regarding timings and payment. We do recommend the use of the school buses as they reduce the impact on the environment, drop off and pick up pupils inside the school grounds and are cheaper over a prolonged period.


Public Transport

There are bus stops near to the main entrance of the school (Arriva 50), but this will involve pupils crossing Blaby Road, which is usually very busy.

Private Car

If you are planning to drive your child to school, please be aware of the limited space on the school site for vehicles. Leaving the site can be difficult at certain times of the day, so we would ask you to consider dropping your child nearby so that they walk the last few hundred metres to school. When collecting your child by car, we would also ask you to consider arriving at school 10-15 minutes after the end of the school day, so that school buses have had the opportunity to depart the school site. It is less congested and dangerous for pupils as a consequence. Please park considerately and avoid blocking driveways and entrances for those who live in close proximity to the college.

Travel Safely




Safety is extremely important when travelling to and from the college by any means of transport. If your child is walking or cycling to school, please ensure that they are aware of the pedestrian crossings locally and the safest routes to school.

Your child is representing the school on the way to and from school and our uniform is recognisable. Therefore, please ensure that your child is aware of their conduct when travelling to and from school.

Please note that even when not in uniform or at weekends and evenings, pupils involved in misbehaviour or public order offences may also be punished by the college for bringing the school into disrepute. We take our commitment to the community extremely seriously!





Other Relevant Information

Tutor Groups

Brockington College receives pupils from a number of different primary schools (26 this academic year). Therefore, tutor groups are created taking into account a number of different factors including:

- Ensuring groups are balanced academically.
- Ensuring groups include pupils from a number of schools.
- Ensuring pupils who are transferring to us on their own are paired up to help them to make friends.

Transition is an anxious time for some, whilst others take it in their stride. We recognise that everyone reacts differently - pupils, parents and carers. The two days of induction mentioned earlier in the Welcome Booklet are designed to support your child through this transition. Although it can be daunting, the opportunity to make new friends and create a wider circle of acquaintances will in the long run be beneficial to all. If, however, you do have any concerns after the two days of induction, please get in contact with us before the summer holidays to ensure we can resolve any issues.

Lockers

Every pupil at Brockington College is allocated a locker. This eliminates the need for pupils to carry bags, coats, PE kits and mobile telephones around. Pupils in Key Stage 3 use 'wallets' to carry their stationery and a small number of books around during the day.

There is a non-refundable charge of £10 for a locker, which parents/carers should pay via ParentPay before the start of the academic year. Pupils will then be issued with a locker key when they start at the college. However if they lose their key, a replacement key must be ordered at a cost of £3.50, again via ParentPay.

At the end of each school year, lockers are emptied and keys are returned to the school to enable cleaning and maintenance to take place.

Library and Resource Centre


The library actively encourages and promotes 'reading for pleasure'. It stocks a large range of fiction and non-fiction books along with daily newspapers and magazines. The library also has access to computers, laptops, tablets and Kindles for pupils to use.

New pupils are enrolled into our library system and may borrow up to two books at a time for a fortnight. The library is open daily and a homework club runs after school.

Data Protection and Acceptable Use

Please read the enclosed privacy notice which explains why we collect, and how we use, personal data. You will need to complete and return the consent form enclosed in this pack, as well as the acceptable use policy.

Medical Matters



Brockington College employs a school health coordinator who acts as the main school first aider.

Key points to note:

- ◇ Pupils with inhalers and epipens should carry them at all times.
- ◇ Inhalers and epipens should be clearly labelled with the pupil's name and form.
- ◇ The college carries an emergency inhaler for use by pupils with asthma in the event of an emergency and if their personal inhaler is not available. Please complete the relevant permission letter in this pack to give permission for this to happen in an emergency.
- ◇ If required, after discussion with the school health coordinator, a spare inhaler and/or epipen can be stored in the first aid room.
- ◇ Pupils with serious medical conditions or allergies may need an Individual Health Care Plan. Please contact the school to discuss this further, if needed.
- ◇ A signed 'Administration of Medicine' form (available on the website) is required if pupils need to take any prescribed medication during the school day.
- ◇ Pupils are not allowed to carry any medications or painkillers in school, other than prescribed inhalers or Epipens.
- ◇ If your child has an injury and/or has reduced mobility, please contact school in order to arrange a risk assessment before returning to school.
