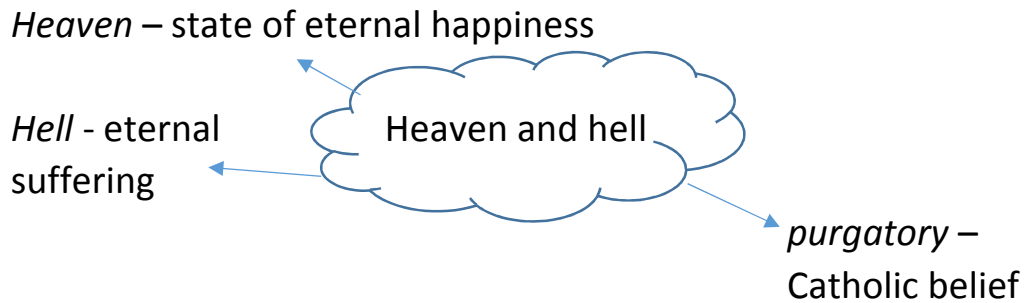

<i>God blessed them and said to them, ‘Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish, birds and every living creature.’</i>	Humans were instructed to make love and have children. Part of God’s plan is for a couple to have children. A couple should share companionship through good times and bad, and try to bring up their children in the way God wants. Humans were instructed by God to rule over all living things. Many Christians see this as an important responsibility and privilege. <i>(Stewardship)</i> . However a minority of Christians have interpreted ‘subdue’ as meaning people can do what they like with it. <i>(Dominion)</i> .	Theme A – marriage and family. Theme B – stewardship and dominion.
