## **BROCKINGTON COLLEGE** **ADMISSION POLICY**

### **INTRODUCTION**

The Governors, who are responsible for admissions to Brockington College, a Church of England Academy have agreed with the Local Authority (LA) to admit 240 pupils for each year group. This number has been agreed between the governors and the LA and applies to admissions for the 2021-22 school year. These arrangements and the admissions criteria (below) are reviewed annually.

Though it is a Church of England Voluntary Aided School, Brockington College seeks to preserve its identity as a College for the local community, believing that this enhances community cohesion and enables those who live within its catchment area to benefit from the facilities offered at the College.

In accordance with school admissions code of practice the Governors will admit a child with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) in accordance with parental preference, provided the school is named as being the appropriate school on the EHCP.

### **ADMISSIONS CRITERIA**

When considering applications for admission to Brockington College, and there are more applications than places available, the Governors will offer places in the following order of priority:

1. **Children who are in public care and those children who were previously looked after children.** *Children in care of a Local Authority and those children who were previously looked after children, but ceased to be so because they were adopted, or became subject to a residence order or special guardianship order, are considered under this criterion. In such circumstance a letter from the last local authority in which the child was in the care of will be required.*
2. **Children living within the school's catchment area of Enderby, Narborough, Huncote, Croft and Thurlaston.** *The child's place of residence is taken to be the parental home. Please note that living in the catchment area does not guarantee you a place at your catchment school. A map of the catchment area for Brockington College is available to view via the Brockington College website home page ([www.brockington.leics.sch.uk](http://www.brockington.leics.sch.uk)).*
3. **Pupils who will have an older brother or sister attending the same school at the same time.** *The term "brother or sister" includes half brother or sister or legally adopted child being regarded as the brother or sister.*
4. **Pupils who have a serious medical condition or exceptional social or domestic needs that make it essential they attend the school requested.** *Professional documentation confirming the situation must be submitted with the application.*
5. **Pupils who have attended a feeder school before the time of transfer.**
6. **Pupils living nearest to the school measured in a straight line distance (home to school front gate).** *Measurement of distance is in a straight line from the point that the home property's front entrance meets a public highway to the school's main designated front gate, using a computerised mapping system. Where there is equal distance then lots will be drawn supervised by an independent officer.*

## **ADMISSIONS MEETINGS**

Formal applications must be made on the Local Authority's common form and returned to the LA by 31 October 2020 (i.e. for admission in September 2021). Parents can apply on line at [www.leics.gov.uk/admissions](http://www.leics.gov.uk/admissions). Admission decisions will be issued by the LA on national offer date 1 March 2021, the 'National Offer Day'.

## **APPEALS**

Whenever possible, parents' wishes will be met. If for any reason an application is refused, parents have the right of appeal to an independent panel.
